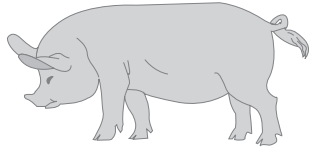
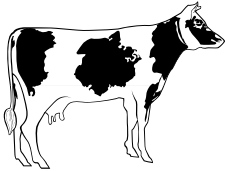


## PEN RESERVATION

Receipt of this form does not constitute entry for competition. Enter your livestock with the clerks before 8:00 p.m. Thursday, July 14, 2011.

## LIVESTOCK RULES AND REGULATIONS

1. No exhibitor of livestock shall be allowed to make more than two entries in one lot. In the special groups and production contests, an exhibitor may make only one entry in each lot.

2. Exhibitors of livestock must keep their stock, stalls and pens in good, neat conditions and open for inspection from 9 a.m. to 9 p.m. **All animal waste material must be removed and placed outside by 9:00 a.m. each day so it can be picked up.**

3. Exhibitors of livestock must inform themselves when their stock will be judged. Stock must be in the show ring promptly after being called. Any exhibitor failing to comply with this order will be ruled out of competition.

4. Ample sheds and pens for livestock on exhibition and competing for premiums will be furnished.

5. Sires, dames and groups entered as such must be owned by the individuals or firms exhibiting them, but the progeny of animals may be shown simply as proof of their breeding qualities without such ownership.

6. Calves under two months of age at the time of exhibition will not be eligible for competition.

7. All animals under exhibition shall be shown to the judges under the supervision of the superintendent.

8. All exhibitors of bulls, one year or over, must lead such animals with a suitable staff attached to a nose ring.

9. In all classes which call for registered stock, all animals over one year must be accompanied by certificate of registration showing that the animal is properly registered in the stud-book, herd-book or flock-book, which is recognized as being authentic for the breed which the animal is supposed to represent.

10. Purebred animals under one year of age should not be required to show certificate of registration, but the exhibitor of such animal should be required to give a certified statement that both sire and dame of such animal are properly registered purebreds.

11. Unless otherwise stated, the dates of computing the ages of animals entered shall be July 1.

12. Superintendent of each livestock division will check registration papers of all purebred livestock sometime during the fair.

### Exhibitors In Beef And Dairy Barn Are Required To Put Bedding In The Aisle Before Checkout.

#### Summary Of State Rules General Requirements For Exhibition Of Livestock And Poultry In Minnesota

The exhibition management may adopt more, but not less restrictive health requirements than required by state rule.

Livestock or poultry known by the exhibitor to have an infectious, communicable disease or to have been exposed to an infectious, communicable disease or to be from a quarantined herd or flock may not be entered in the exhibition. **Warts and ringworm are considered communicable diseases.** Therefore, livestock affected by these diseases cannot be exhibited. A statement from a veterinarian that an animal is being treated for these diseases is not acceptable.

Beginning on the opening day of the exhibition, the Official Veterinarian will inspect all livestock during the exhibition.

The Official Veterinarian will order the

immediate removal to a quarantine facility or removal from the exhibition premises of any livestock with symptoms of infectious or communicable diseases. Animals placed in a quarantine facility must remain there until removed from the exhibition premises. They may not enter a show ring. This includes livestock with warts or ringworm.

**All testing must be conducted prior to the exhibition, and a record of the test results on a test chart or Intrastate Health Certificate must accompany the tested animal.**

Livestock and poultry entered in a petting exhibit are not exempt from the exhibition rules if the animals are from more than one farm or there are other animals at the exhibit.

#### POULTRY

Originating from Minnesota

Except waterfowl and pigeons

1. Identified by leg or wing band.
2. Negative pullorum-typhoid test within 90 days, or record of origin from a flock tested negative within the last 12 months.
3. Turkeys must be tested at a laboratory for S. typhimurium and mycoplasmas, or have a statement of origin if less than 5 months old.

#### SWINE

Originating from Minnesota

1. All swine, including barrows, must have a negative official (ELISA, PCFIA, Latex, SN) pseudorabies test within 30 days prior to the opening date of the exhibition or originate directly from a Qualified Negative or Controlled Vaccinated herd.

2. Differential pseudorabies tests are not approved for exhibition.

#### DOGS

1. Dogs over 6 months of age must be accompanied by a current Certificate of Rabies

Vaccination issued by a licensed veterinarian.

### CATTLE, GOATS, SHEEP, HORSES

Originating from Minnesota

1. No specific requirements. Refer to Summary of State Rule General Requirements For Exhibition Of Livestock And Poultry In Minnesota.

### CATTLE, GOATS, SHEEP, HORSES, SWINE AND POULTRY

#### Not Originating From Minnesota

1. Animals must meet the Minnesota Importation requirements in addition to the requirements outlined in this summary.

2. Health certificates must list the Minnesota Exhibition as consignee and will be accepted if examination and tests are conducted within 90 days prior to the exhibition, except swine pseudorabies tests, which must be made within 30 days. The differential pseudorabies tests are not approved for exhibition.

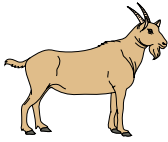

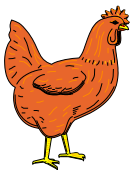

1. Refer to Livestock Rules and Regulations found on page 17.
2. Within 90 days prior to the opening date of exhibition, all poultry, except waterfowl and pigeons, must be negative to the rapid whole-blood plate test for pullerum and typhoid diseases.

No test shall be required on poultry originating directly from parent stock tested and found negative within the preceding 12 months.

3. An officially recognized form signed by an authorized agent must be present to show compliance with this section. Official forms from other states shall be approved by the official agency of state or origin. Each bird shall be identified and band number recorded on the official form.

4. Applications for entry must be made and entry fees paid on or before July 1 using Pen Reservation Blank on page 17.

5. Entries will be accepted on a first come basis until the coops are filled. EXHIBITORS SEND IN ADVANCE REGISTRATION. State breed name and lot number.

6. No exhibitor is allowed more than two entries in each lot and only one entry in pairs, groups and production lots. No bird or rabbit

shall compete for more than one premium except when competing in pairs or groups.

7. Entries from the same family may be limited depending on space.

8. All entries must be in cages and in place by 8:00 p.m. Thursday, July 14 and will not be released until 7:00 p.m. Sunday, July 17.

9. Feeders, water containers and cages will be furnished.

10. All exhibitors must report to fair entry clerk on entry day, Thursday, July 14, to secure entry tags and insure proper recording of your entry.

11. Members of 4-H Clubs and FFA Chapters in Clay County may show the same birds or rabbits in Open Class providing they apply and pay entry fees before July 1.

### CLASS 2 -- SHEAF, ETC.--

### FRESH VEGETABLE PREPARATION

To assist the gardener in selecting and preparing vegetables for exhibit, the following suggestions are made:

**BEANS, SNAP** - Harvest before constrictions appear between seeds, when seeds are about half-grown. Ends of pods should not be broken off in picking. Pods should be uniform in size. Pods should be wiped clean, but not washed. Leave stems attached.

**BEETS, CARROTS** - Root crops should be mature, but not over grown, pithy or coarse in texture. Tops trimmed off 1-1/4 or 1-1/2 inches above the crown. Side roots trimmed off but not the taproot. Clean by brushing.

**BROCCOLI** - Heads should be dark or purplish green and compact. Avoid yellow flowers in head. Cut stems about 5 inches from top of head.

**CABBAGE** - Stems cut about 1/2 or 1/4 inch below the head. Remove blemished or broken leaves. Leave few wrapper leaves. Specimens may be washed.

**CELERY** - Remove the roots of stalk and trim butt to form a triangle for pyramid. Trim diseased and broken leaves on outside until color is uniform.

**CUCUMBERS** - *Pickling* - select fruits 3 to 5 inches long. Specimens should be same stage of maturity and uniform in size, shape and color. *Slicers* -select fruits that are straight, dark green and 6 to 10 inches long. They should be uniform in size, shape and color. Leave stems attached. Clean with a soft brush.

**KOHLRABI** - Roots removed just below the ball. Remove all but the center 4 to 6 leaves. Select specimens that are uniform, medium size and not hard or woody. Skin should be easily punctured by thumbnail. They should be clean,

but not washed.

**LETTUCE** - Specimens should have fresh, crisp, well-colored leaves. Remove older outer leaves that show yellowing. Place roots in jar of water.

**ONIONS** - Have specimens mature and thoroughly cured. The neck should be small. Do not peel to give a slick appearance. Only such outer scales that are broken or discolored should be removed. Cut tops 1-1/2 inches long. Small basal roots should be left intact, but trimmed to a uniform length of 1/2 inch. Wipe or brush, but do not wash.

**PEAS** - Select bright, green well-filled with seeds, the best eating stage. Do not wash, as bloom should be preserved.

**PEPPERS** - Stem should be left 1/2 to 1 inch long.

**POTATOES** - Tubers should be uniform in size, shape and color. Washing is permitted but do not blemish the skin by scrubbing. Avoid specimens with defects or disease.

**RADISHES** - Tap root cut 1/2 inch and tops cut to 1/2 inch.

**RHUBARB** - Select stalks that are straight, uniform and unblemished. Stalks should be pulled from the plant, not cut. Cut off blade leaf 2 inches above the stalk.

**SPINACH** - Select uniformly, colored, clean, fresh, crisp leaves. Wash in cold water. Stalks should be pulled from the plant. Trim off roots to crown. Remove outer damaged leaves. Place in jar of water to prevent wilting.

**SUMMER SQUASH** - Select small to medium size fruit when the rind is soft and easily punctured with thumbnail. Leave about 1/2 inch of stem and wipe fruits clean.

**TOMATOES** - Select fruits that are uniform in size, shape and color. Leave 1/2 inch stem on or remove stems. Fruits should be free of cracks and blemishes.

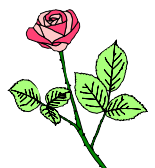
